What is in this new Bill (according to our government)







OUR NEW PLAN FOR IMMIGRATION WILL:







Stop illegal arrivals gaining immediate entry into the asylum system if they have travelled through a safe country - like France.

Increase the maximum sentence for illegally entering the UK.

Grant resettled refugees indefinite leave to remain.

Better integrate refugees who are resettled.

What we think this means

- Make it harder for people to seek asylum
- Criminalise people with credible and legal asylum claims just based on how they arrive in the UK
- Make it quicker for people to be removed unfairly and without proper legal advice
- Criminalise people for helping people to reach our shores

Overall, we think its an anti-refugee bill



When are the key dates?

- The Bill was published yesterday
- There will be a debate on 19th & 20th July,
- The stages of the bill mean that it is likely to be debated until Autumn

Most bills start in the House of Commons

- 650 MPs, elected by the people
- Current Government has 80 seat majority
- Once a Bill is 'introduced' it has to go through a process before becoming law





Second Reading



Chance for MPs to debate the Bill;

charities will often send a briefing to MPs to help them think through what they want to say

MPs will often talk about how the Bill might impact their communities



Committee Stage

This is where the bill is looked at very carefully by a group of crossparty MPs. The biggest group will be from the Conservative Party as they have the majority.

Every clause and schedule of the Bill is examined, and charities often such changes (called amendments).





Report Stage and Third Reading



At Report Stage, amendments have been made by the committee and there is a chance for more debate by all MPs

After the report stage, there is more discussion and then it goes to a vote. This is called Third Reading.

House of Lords



- The House of Lords has 790 people in it. They are often called 'Peers'
- Some are 'hereditary' (like the Queen), most are nominated by political parties.
- You can write to any Lord and share your views on the Bill - best to find one with an interest in refugee protection
- The House of Lords will look at the Bill and make suggestions (amendments)

Parliamentary ping-pong

- The Bill then returns to the House of Commons. If they accepts the amendments of the House of Lords, the Bill is passed.
- If the House of Commons rejects the amendments, the Bill travels between the House of Commons and the House of Lords until they reach an agreement but...





Final decision belongs to the Government





Once the Bill has done through all these stages, it goes to the Queen to sign it off!







So, what can we do?

- Share our stories by telling people what its like to struggle to find safety ... and what it means to be able to rebuild a life
- Show that lots of people in the UK care about those seeking asylum
- Make lots of noise
 - Through social media
 - The Press
 - By contacting your MP



Share your experience

- Stories will always have more of an impact and engage audiences
 more than just facts which are abstract. They help to avoid sweeping
 generalisations and connect with audiences.
- Always connect your story with the change you want to see.
- Share positive and community led stories where possible.
- Can also use examples of local welcome, support and community.
- Remember that you are in charge of sharing your history



Some ideas for key messages

- The UK has a proud history of welcoming refugees like me and want to see this tradition continue
- We're calling for calling for a more effective, fair and humane approach to the refugee system in the UK
- We believe that people shouldn't be given refugee status based on how they arrived here, but the danger they are in.
- We're calling on the government to fundamentally rethink these proposals and introduce new safe routes, so that people don't have to risk their life taking dangerous journeys
- Refugees want to contribute to our communities, help us do



Making noise – standing up for asylum

- Sometimes it feels difficult to speak about refugee protection
 - There is a noisy minority who shout about it all the time but...
 - Lots of people in the UK are on our side 25% of the population!
- Most people aren't sure what they think about it, talking to those people is important but we have to think carefully about how we do it
 - They believe in safety
 - They like it when people do well
 - They don't like 'big numbers'
 - They don't like being told off
